

Beware of Distraction Scammers

RALEIGH, NC (April 26, 2018)...Law enforcement officials in Wake County have received multiple reports of scammers posing as flooring salesmen, and targeting the elderly. These crooks work as a two or three-person team. They often put the victim off-balance by pretending to have met or done work for them previously. They may also claim to have known a close family member, or to have once lived in the neighborhood. After gaining entry, one scammer engages the victim in conversation. Another brings flooring samples into the home, but eventually one of the group slips away to steal credit cards, cash and jewelry. These thieves are striking every few months, hitting one or two victims before moving to another area.

In this instance the suspects are male but another version of the distraction scam involves two women, one of them apparently pregnant and in some distress. They appear at a potential victim's door, asking if the pregnant woman can use the bathroom. While one crook engages the victim in conversation or makes a telephone call, the other (who may not be pregnant at all) collects valuables while pretending to use the bathroom.

Distraction scammers have also been known to masquerade as plainclothes police officers looking for an escaped prisoner, or utility company employees taking indoor measurements for home energy saving projects. Consumers, and especially the elderly, should always be extremely careful who they let into their home. Remember, distraction scammers are slick, friendly, and good at their game. Don't let them in.

If you are contacted by a scammer, report it to the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division by calling 1-877-5-NO-SCAM or by filing a complaint online.

Best Banana Bread

Ingredients

Vegetable oil spray, for misting the loaf pan 11/2 cups all-purpose flour, plus flour for dusting the loaf pan 3/4 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup sugar 3/4 cup vegetable oil 3 tablespoons buttermilk 2 large eggs, lightly beaten 1 cup mashed bananas (from 2 large or 3 small bananas)

Instructions

Place a rack in the center of the oven and preheat the oven to 325°F. Lightly mist a 9 by 5-inch loaf pan with vegetable oil spray and dust it with flour. Shake out the excess flour. Set the pan aside. Place the flour, baking soda, and salt in a large mixing bowl and stir with a fork to combine. Add the sugar and stir to combine. Add the oil, buttermilk, eggs, and mashed banana and stir until the mixture is smooth but just blended, 50 to 60 strokes. Pour the batter into the prepared loaf pan. Bake the bread until it is golden brown and the top springs back when gently pressed with a finger, 1 hour and 15 to 20 minutes. Transfer the loaf pan to a wire rack and let the bread cool for about 15 minutes. Run a knife around the edges of the bread and give the pan a few good shakes to loosen the bread. Invert the bread onto a wire rack, then invert it again onto another wire rack, so that it cools right side up. Let the loaf continue to cool for about 1 hour.

Land Acquisition to Increase Johns River Game Land by 2,500 Acres

RALEIGH, NC (April 27, 2018)...The N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission has completed a land acquisition that will add 2,500 acres to the Johns River Game Land in Burke County. The land was purchased from Duke Energy on April 11.

"The Johns River land acquisition exemplifies the power of partnership enabling the Commission to increase this game land by 66 percent," said Gordon Myers, the Commission's executive director. "This game land will provide lifetimes of access and opportunity for many of our constituents and it enables us to conserve the abundance of habitat for multiple significant species."

The acreage will adjoin the 3,887 acres currently known as the Johns River Game Land, which was originally purchased with funds provided by Duke Energy as part of the 2006 Catawba-Wateree Comprehensive Relicensing Agreement (CRA) and grants from the Clean Water and Natural Heritage Trust Funds. Following this latest acquisition, the game land will encompass 6,448 acres.

"This achievement is a testament to partnerships, perseverance and patience," said Steve Jester, Duke Energy's vice president of water strategy, hydro licensing and lake services. "The concept of preserving land in the Johns River Basin resulted from Duke Energy's partnership and stakeholder-focused approach to the Catawba-Wateree Hydroelectric Project relicensing process spanning 2003 to 2006. In addition to that three-year period, continued efforts yielded the Upper Catawba Trails Agreement and associated purchase options in 2008. Today that collaboration during the yearslong relicensing process is rewarded as we celebrate forever protecting these special lands for the people of North Carolina."

Johns River Game Land provides opportunities for hunting, fishing and other recreational activities. Several access locations to the game land will be provided directly from N.C. Department of Transportation-maintained roads.

With more than 2 million acres of public game lands in North Carolina, outdoor enthusiasts have ample opportunity to experience hunting, fishing, hiking, birding, nature photography and more. For more information, visit www.ncwildlife.org/gamelands.

GRANITE FALLS, NC (April 30, 2018)...The Town of Granite Falls has earned a Diamond Level Reliable Public Power Provider (RP3)® designation from the American Public Power Association (APPA) for providing reliable and safe electric service. The Diamond designation is the highest designation awarded by the APPA. Neil James, Manager of Distribution Operations at Santee Cooper, South Carolina and chair of the Association's RP3 Review Panel, presented the designations on April 30 during the Association's annual Engineering & Operations Technical Conference held in Raleigh, N.C.

HUDSON, NC (April 27, 2018)...Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute is introducing a new class that will help individuals with little or no manufacturing experience acquire the basic training needed to land a manufacturing apprenticeship or entry-level job.



CCC&TI to Add Practical Nursing Program, Host Info Session May 16

HUDSON, NC (May 1, 2018)...Caldwell Community College and Technical Institute plans to add a new Health Sciences program in early 2019 that will provide students with another path to a career in Nursing and fill a vital need for local health care providers.

Pending state approval, CCC&TI will add Practical Nursing to its Health Sciences offerings on the Caldwell Campus in Hudson beginning in the Spring Semester of 2019. The application to add the program was approved by the CCC&TI Board of Trustees on April 18 and is now awaiting approval from the state.

The decision to add the program is based on a high demand for Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs) and the demand from students wanting to pursue the 1-year diploma program. CCC&TI currently offers a 2-year Associate Degree in Nursing, which allows students to test for Registered Nurse licensure. The existing Nursing program is among CCC&TI's most successful and in-demand offerings.

"Many of our students are unable to make a commitment of two or more years to become a registered nurse, even though they have a strong desire to enter the nursing profession," Health Sciences Dean Barbara Harris said. "By offering the LPN program, students who are unable to make that time commitment due to financial or other reasons would be able to accomplish their goal of entering the nursing profession with the possibility of continuing in the pathway at a future time."

Students would be required to meet certain General Education requirements to apply for the program, and upon admission would complete the program in one year. Graduates will be eligible to apply to take the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX-PN), which is required for practice as a Licensed Practical Nurse. Employment opportunities include hospitals, rehabilitation/long-term care/home health facilities, clinics and physicians' offices.

"Currently there are 62 positions for Licensed Practical and Licensed Vocational nurses in the Western Piedmont area of North Carolina and 500 open positions in all of North Carolina," Harris said. "Our employer survey showed a salary range of \$14.50 to \$25 an hour for LPNs."

To introduce the new program to the community, CCC&TI will host a Practical Nursing information session at 5 p.m. on May 16 in Room B-104 on the Caldwell Campus in Hudson.

Troxler encourages horse owners to vaccinate against mosquito-borne diseases and rabies

RALEIGH, NC (April 30, 2018)...Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler is encouraging horse owners to have their animals vaccinated against Eastern Equine Encephalomyelitis and West Nile Virus

Mosquito-borne disease can be deadly to horses, donkeys, mules...

"April until November is prime mosquito-breeding season in North Carolina and when horses are at risk if not properly vaccinated," Troxler said. "EEE is fatal 90 percent of the time in horses and WNV has a fatality rate of 30 percent. Both diseases are preventable by vaccination."

There were six recorded cases of EEE in horses in North Carolina in 2017, but the mild winter could cause that number to go up this year, State Veterinarian Doug Meckes said. Meckes recommends that equine owners talk to their veterinarians about an effective vaccination protocol to protect horses from mosquito-borne diseases. The combination vaccination initially requires multiple injections for horses, mules and donkeys that have no prior vaccination history. Meckes recommends a booster shot every six months.

Mosquitoes can breed in any puddle that lasts for more than four days, so removing any source of standing water can reduce the chance of exposing animals to WNV or EEE. Keeping horses in stalls at night, using insect screens and fans and turning off lights after dusk can also help reduce exposure to mosquitoes. Insect repellants can be effective if used according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Symptoms of EEE include impaired vision, aimless wandering, head pressing, circling, inability to swallow, irregular staggering gait, paralysis, convulsions and death. Once a horse has been bitten by an infected mosquito, it may take three to 10 days for symptoms to appear.

Symptoms of WNV include fever, weakness or paralysis of hind limbs, impaired vision, head pressing, seizures and aimless wandering.

"If your horses or other equine animals exhibit any symptoms of EEE or WNV, contact your veterinarian immediately," Meckes said.

People, horses and birds can become infected from a bite by a mosquito carrying the diseases, but there is no evidence that horses can transmit the viruses to other horses, birds or people through direct contact.

"It's also a great time to make sure your animal is current on its rabies vaccination, Troxler said. "In North Carolina we see about five cases of rabies in livestock each year. Horses are naturally curious animals, which puts them at risk for a bite if a rabid animal gets through their fence line."

Man arrested for possessing a firearm on School Property

LENOIR, NC (May 1, 2018)...On May 1, 2018, at 11:26 am, The Caldwell County Sheriff's Office received a report of an individual at the lobby of the Gymnasium at Happy Valley School.
