



Davenport A+ School's 3rd grade loves Poetry!

LENOIR, NC (March 29, 2019) -- Carly Schwartz and her team of 3rd Grade Teachers at Davenport A+ Elementary School recently were the recipients of a Grant awarding poetry books to their classrooms. The poetry books are by local area author and poet, LB Sedlacek.

Her poetry books, "Poetry in LA (Lenoir Area)," were purchased and placed in each 3rd Grade classroom. They are now part of the 3rd Grade poetry curriculum at the school.

Prior to the workshops, the teachers led their students on a Google classroom walk of the places mentioned in Sedlacek's poems in the book. This helped the kids learn more about the poems and to prepare their Questions for the workshop.

As part of the Grant, Mrs. Sedlacek taught 2 days of poetry



workshops with all of the 3rd Graders. The kids listened as she spoke about poetry and how she got started writing poems about Lenoir. She then let them pick out poems from the book for her to read. She next took Questions from the students. The last part of the workshop was for Sedlacek to assist the kids with a poem writing exercise. Ultimately, the children will have poems in a poetry book of their own through the school.

Sedlacek said her favorite parts of the workshops were the enthusiasm in learning about poetry and the written arts in general, and the questions the students had for her. She also enjoyed them asking for their favorite poems to be read from the book! The most requested poems for her to read were her poems about the downtown sculptures, the pool (Aquatic Center), the 2017 Eclipse, the Gravity Games, the annual Sculpture Festival, downtown Lenoir poems, the car shows, and the Blackberry Festival.

McCreary Cancer Center Earns ACR Accreditation

LENOIR, NC (April 2, 2019) -- McCreary Cancer Center, a service of UNC Hospitals, has been awarded a three-year term of accreditation in radiation oncology as the result of a recent review by the American College of Radiology (ACR). Radiation oncology (radiation therapy) is the careful use of high-energy radiation to treat cancer. A radiation oncologist may use radiation to cure cancer or to relieve a cancer patient's pain.

The ACR is the nation's oldest and most widely accepted radiation oncology accrediting body, with over 700 accredited sites, and 30 years of accreditation experience. The ACR seal of accreditation represents the highest level of quality and patient safety. It is awarded only to facilities meeting specific Practice Guidelines and Technical Standards developed by ACR after a peer-review evaluation by board-certified radiation oncologists and medical physicists who are experts in the field. Patient care and treatment, patient safety, personnel qualifications, adequacy of facility equipment, quality control procedures. and quality assurance programs are assessed. The findings are reported to the ACR Committee on Radiation Oncology Accreditation, which subsequently provides the practice with a comprehensive report they can use for continuous practice improvement.

The ACR is a national professional organization serving more than 36,000 diagnostic/interventional radiologists, radiation oncologists, nuclear medicine physicians, and medical physicists with programs focusing on the practice of medical imaging and radiation oncology and the delivery of comprehensive health care services.

Caldwell Journal Weekly Recipe Meatball Subs

Ingredients

1/2 c. diced celery 1/2 c. diced carrots 1/2 c. diced onion 2 cloves garlic, minced 1 c. freshly chopped parsley 3/4 c. bread crumbs 1/2 c. freshly grated Parmesan, divided 1 large egg 2 tbsp. ketchup Kosher salt Freshly ground black pepper 1 lb. ground beef 1/2 lb. ground pork 4 hero rolls, sliced lengthwise 1 c. marinara

Instructions

1 c. shredded mozzarella

Preheat oven to 400°. In a large bowl, mix together celery, carrots, onions, garlic, parsley, bread crumbs, 1/4 cup Parmesan, egg, and ketchup and season with salt and pepper until well combined. Add beef and pork, mixing together by hand until just combined (don't over mix to maintain tender meatballs). Form 1 1/2" meatballs and place in an oven-safe dish or baking sheet. Do not overcrowd.

Bake until meatballs are browned and no longer pink, 20 minutes.

Meanwhile, toast rolls and warm marinara in a small saucepan. Spoon marinara over meatballs and top with mozzarella. Return to oven until cheese is melty.

Place meatballs in toasted hero rolls and sprinkle with remaining 1/4 cup Parmesan before serving.

Over 100 Vietnam Veterans attended NCNG'S Vietnam War Era Veterans Day event

RALEIGH, NC (April 1, 2019) -- Hundreds of North Carolina citizens, civic leaders, and NC Guardsmen welcomed over 100 Vietnam Veterans to Joint Force Headquarters during a Vietnam Veterans Commemoration event, in Raleigh, April 1, 2019, as a part of the National Vietnam War Commemoration program.

The Key note speaker for the event was Medal of Honor recipient retired Col. Walter J. Marm who served in Vietnam with 1st Battalion, 7th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile). In 1965, Marm took part in the Battle of Ia Drang and was later awarded the Medal of Honor his actions during the battle.

In 2002, the movie "We Were Soldiers", starring Mel Gibson, told the story of Marm's unit during the Battle of Ia Drang, the first major battle between the North Vietnamese Army and the United States military.

Marm spoke to over 400 attendees about his experience in Vietnam and how important days like today are to honor and thank fellow veterans who served during a difficult time in our nation's history.

"I wear the Medal of Honor for all the men and women who served in Vietnam," said Marm. "Most of all, for those who did not come home and those who are still unaccounted for."

"We live in the greatest country in the world, because of our military, and I salute say thank you to all veterans and current serving Guardsmen, Reservists and active duty service members," Marm said in closing.

On behalf of Governor Cooper, Secretary Larry Hall, N.C. Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, and Secretary Erik Hooks, NC Department of Public Safety, were in attendance and each spoke to the audience about the importance in honoring and remembering Vietnam veterans for the service and sacrifice.

The Commemoration event was hosted by the NC National Guard and brought many veterans groups to JFHQ including the USO of North Carolina, the NC National Guard Association and the Disabled American Veterans organization (DAV).

The USO Show Troupe from New York City provided entertainment during the event.

The final portion of the program invited all Vietnam Veterans to the stage to receive a Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin.

Lunch, provided by the North Carolina National Guard Association and the USO, was served following the event.

On March 28, 2017, President Trump signed into law The Vietnam War Veterans Recognition Act of 2017, establishing The National Vietnam War Veterans Day that will be celebrated each year on March 29.

According to the Department of Defense, there have been over 1,600 Vietnam Commemoration events in many states across the nation since March 29th to honor and thank U.S. Vietnam veterans and their families for their service and sacrifices.

2019 N.C. strawberry season under way

RALEIGH, NC (March 29, 2019) -- April signals the start of strawberry season in North Carolina, and local growers are expecting a very good crop that should last through Memorial Day.

"There should be plenty of berries this year despite a wet and cold first quarter in 2019," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "We encourage consumers to visit a pick-your-own farm, go to a farmers market or stop by a roadside stand to get the freshest berries available."

Consumers also can find locally grown strawberries in grocery stores and restaurants by looking for the Got to Be NC logo. The Got to Be NC program is the official state identity program for N.C. agricultural products, and lets consumers know they are buying a product grown, raised, caught or made in North Carolina.

North Carolina is the fourth-largest producer of strawberries in the nation, with about 1,100 acres harvested across the state. Growers have already started picking in Eastern North Carolina. Piedmont growers will begin picking in mid-April and growers in the mountains should start by the first of May. The peak of the season is traditionally Mother's Day.

The department and the N.C. Strawberry Association will celebrate with two Strawberry Day events in May. The first event is at the State Farmers Market in Raleigh on May 2 and at the Robert G. Shaw Piedmont Triad Farmers Market in Colfax on May 3. Both celebrations include a strawberry recipe contest, ice cream samples and a visit by Suzy Strawberry.

A High-Speed, Detachable, Quad Chairlift for Beginners at Sugar Mountain Ski Resort

SUGAR MOUNTAIN SKI RESORT, NC (April 1, 2019) -- This summer and fifty years later, a four-seater, detachable, high-speed chairlift will be installed replacing Sugar Mountain Resort's original, two passenger, fixed-grip Easy Street chairlift.

Designed and engineered by Doppelmayr and specifically for beginners, the new 1,800-foot, silver bullet, quad chairlift cuts travel time from six minutes to two-and-ahalf minutes but slows significantly for easy and gentle loading and unloading. "The majority of our guests are beginners who go on to develop skiing and snowboarding as a life-long, family activity. Generation after generation lays roots right here on our beginner terrain. This hasn't changed in Sugar's fifty-year history. Replacing the original Easy Street lift is not just an upgrade, it is example of the continued commitment to offering our guests an exceptional mountain experience," explains Sugar Mountain Resort owner, Gunther Jochl.

The new Easy Street lift carries 2,400 passengers per hour compared to 1,050 passengers per hour prior and increases the Resort's overall uphill capacity from 10,518 passengers per hour to 11,868 passengers per hour.

NCSHP Partners In Drive To Save Lives Campaign

RALEIGH, NC (April 2, 2019) -- The North Carolina State Highway Patrol will once again join 14 other states in an effort to reduce collisions along the I-95 corridor. Through support from the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) and states along the eastern portion of the U.S., the Drive to Save Lives Campaign is intended to increase the visibility of law enforcement officers over a period of three days.

Interstate 95 (I-95) is approximately 1,920 miles in length and is currently considered one of the deadliest highways in the country. On average it supports 72,000 vehicles per day of daily traffic (with peak daily traffic over 300,000 vehicles) and it has over 10,000 vehicles for its average daily truck traffic (with peak daily truck traffic being over 31,000), per the I-95 Corridor Coalition.

This year's initiative will coincide with National Distracted Driving Awareness Month. Nine percent of 2016's fatal crashes involved distraction. In 2016 alone distracted driving led to 3,450 deaths and in 2015, 391,000 people were injured in motor vehicle crashes involving distracted driving. Teens remain the largest age group involved in distracted driving-related fatal crashes. With distracted driving being proven to be a grossly underreported violation, these numbers are only the minimum. (NHTSA)

The campaign will begin on Friday, April 5th and conclude Sunday, April 7th. Troopers from every state along I-95 will be out in full force, in hopes of reducing the number of fatal collisions to zero.
