"Unfortunately, prescription drugs are like a magnet to people struggling with addiction or young people looking to mess around," said Attorney General Josh Stein. "Extra, unneeded prescriptions are helping to fuel the opioid epidemic. But there is one thing each one of us can do to make a difference and keep people safe in our communities: safely dispose of unneeded medication and lock up any other prescriptions to ensure they will not get in the wrong hands."

Every day, approximately five North Carolinians die from an opioid overdose. The majority of people who misuse prescriptions drugs report getting the drugs from family and friends—often taken from their medicine cabinets without their knowing. In 2016, 705 million opioid pills were prescribed in North Carolina, many of which sit unused in medicine cabinets.

Caldwell Journal Weekly Recipe

Classic Stuffed Peppers

Ingredients

1/2 c. uncooked rice
2 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil, plus more for drizzling
1 medium onion, chopped
1 tbsp. tomato paste
3 cloves garlic, minced
1 lb. ground beef
1 (14.5-oz.) can diced tomatoes
1 tsp. dried oregano
Kosher salt
Freshly ground black pepper
6 bell peppers, tops and cores removed
1 c. shredded Monterey jack

Freshly chopped parsley, for garnish Instructions

Preheat oven to 400°. In a small saucepan, prepare rice according to package instructions. In a large skillet over medium heat, heat oil. Cook onion until soft, about 5 minutes. Stir in tomato paste and garlic and cook until fragrant, about 1 minute more. Add ground beef and cook, breaking up meat with a wooden spoon, until no longer pink, 6 minutes. Drain fat.

Return beef mixture to skillet, then stir in cooked rice and diced tomatoes. Season with oregano, salt, and pepper. Let simmer until liquid has reduced slightly, about 5 minutes.

Place peppers cut side-up in a 9"-x-13" baking dish and drizzle with oil. Spoon beef mixture into each pepper and top with Monterey jack, then cover baking dish with foil.

Bake until peppers are tender, about 35 minutes. Uncover and bake until cheese is bubbly, 10 minutes more. Garnish with parsley before serving.

City of Lenoir receives \$300K to help clean up blighted property

LENOIR, NC (April 23, 2019) -- The City of Lenoir received a \$300,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission to help clean up a blighted property in town. The property, remnants of an old furniture plant, sits at the corner of Virginia Street and College Avenue.

City Council accepted the grant and authorized the City's \$250,000 cash match Tuesday, April 23, during the Committee of the Whole meeting.

"The property is in a good location in the city," City Manager Scott Hildebran said. "But developers aren't very interested given the uncertainty of its condition. The grant funds will help us clean up the site and prime it for redevelopment."

The 15-acre site was home to a furniture plant for more than 100 years. In 2009, Applied Abatement Concepts demolished buildings on the property for scrap. The company then abandoned the site, went bankrupt, and left debris everywhere. In 2014, the City foreclosed on the property for taxes owed.

"Staff researched a lot of options, but given the issues with the site, no one wanted to take it on," Hildebran said. "The City stepped up and took ownership through foreclosure. Staff has been working since to clean up the site."

During that time, Public Utilities Director Radford Thomas and Greg Icenhour with Mid-Atlantic Associates led efforts to secure an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Brownfields grant. The Brownfields program helps local governments evaluate and clean up abandoned industrial sites.

Earlier this year, thanks to the efforts of Thomas, Icenhour, and the City's Brownfields Committee, the City received its first \$300,000 Brownfields grant.

Last year, the Western Piedmont Council of Governments helped the City apply for the ARC grant. Staff will leverage the ARC grant and City funds to clean up the site and then use the Brownfields grant to perform an environmental evaluation of the property. The goal is to secure a Brownfields agreement for the site.

Brownfields agreements remove environmental liability from owners. Potential environmental liability usually drives away developers and investors.



The Virginia Street property is next to the City's Rail Trail Greenway as well as the Unity Park Community Gardens. The Rail Trail will connect the historic Lenoir Freight Depot, the Community Gardens, the Virginia Street site, and the City's first residential/industrial building permitted in Lenoir. Carolina Custom Cabinet's property houses two residential apartment units within the manufacturing building.

"The City's vision for this area as 'Funkytown' includes promoting the redevelopment of historic industrial properties with a variety of new uses," Planning Director Jenny Wheelock said. "We're encouraging a mix of industrial, commercial, and residential uses to co-exist with the recreational opportunities in the area."

Carolina Custom Cabinet's property was recently placed on a study list of historic properties, along with the Lenoir Freight Depot, the Blue Bell building, the Steele Cotton Mill (a.k.a Bost Lumber), and Fairfield Chair Plant #1.

The City plans to start paving the Rail Trail Greenway this year. The Rail Trail eventually will be certified as a segment of the Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail.

"A lot of pieces of the Funkytown puzzle are starting to come together," Wheelock said. "It's really exciting. There is a lot of potential in that area of town."

The total project budget is \$768,000. The budget includes \$45,000 in EPA Funds, \$173,000 in in-kind funds (appraised value of the property), the \$300,000 ARC grant, and a required cash match of \$250,000 in City funds.

Hildebran said he appreciated the hard work of everyone involved in the project.

"I want to thank all the folks who've made this possible," Hildebran said. "It's taken a lot of work to get to this point."



Black Bears are on the Move – What to Do and What Not to Do

RALEIGH, N.C. (April 24, 2019) – Become BearWise. That's the advice N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission biologists are giving now that the weather is warm, and bears are on the move.

Bear sightings throughout the state are increasingly common as more people move into and near bear habitat. While bears are not inherently dangerous and are rarely aggressive toward people, biologists urge people to be cautious and follow the six BearWise Basics to reduce potential conflicts and live responsibly with black bears.

The first BearWise Basic is probably the most critical. Never feed a bear – either intentionally or unintentionally. Feeding bears trains them to approach homes and people for more food. Bears are particularly attracted to human garbage, pet food and other human-associated foods, like bird seed. Bears will defend themselves if a person gets too close, so don't risk your safety or theirs. People should also:

- Secure food, garbage and recycling. Food and food odors attract bears so don't reward them with easily available food or garbage. Bags of trash inside cans stored in a garage, sheds or other secure area; or use garbage cans or trash containers with a secure latching system or that are bear-resistant. Place trash outside as late as possible, on trash pick-up days not the night before.
- Remove bird feeders when bears are active. Birdseed and other grains have high calorie content making them very attractive to bears.
- Never leave pet food outdoors. Feed outdoor pets portion sizes that will be completely eaten during each meal and remove leftover food and food bowl.
- Clean and store grills. After you use an outdoor grill, clean it thoroughly and make sure that all grease and fat is removed.
- Alert neighbors to bear activity. See bears in the area or evidence of bear activity? Tell your neighbors and share info on how to avoid bear conflicts. Bears have adapted to living near people; now it's up to us to adapt to living near bears.

In addition to removing food attractants, residents can:

- Install electric fencing, which will protect bee hives, dumpsters, gardens, compost piles and other potential food sources.
- Consider using a bear-resistant trash container.
- Talk to neighbors and consider becoming a certified BearWise community. BearWise communities commit to coexisting responsibly with bears, securing all potential food sources, and knowing when and how to report bear activity. BearWise certified communities work together to prevent conflicts between bears and humans.

While black bears, by nature, are not aggressive animals, they can inspire fear, anxiety and even fascination, in people who encounter them. And spring is a likely time to encounter black bears. In April, black bears are emerging from winter hibernation and may be sighted moving through residential areas as they search for food. If left alone, most bears that have wandered into a residential area will quickly retreat to their natural habitat, particularly if no food source is around.

"No matter where you are or where you live, if you encounter a bear, the most important thing to do is leave the bear alone. Don't try to feed it or chase it off — we can't stress this enough," said Colleen Olfenbuttel, the Commission's black bear and furbearer biologist. "Crowds of people can unnerve a bear, perhaps causing it to act defensively."

North Carolina's bear populations are concentrated in the mountains and coastal plain, but sightings sometimes occur in Piedmont towns, usually in May, June and July. This is the time when young bears, called transient bears, are looking for a new home after being pushed away by the adult female bear as she begins breeding again.

"While these young bears, typically males, may appear to be wandering aimlessly around, they are not necessarily lost," Olfenbuttel said. "Most are simply exploring their new surroundings and will move on, particularly if they are left alone and there is no food around."

When Commission staff receive a report of a transient bear in an area, they assess the situation to determine if the bear poses a threat to public safety or property, or if the bear is significantly threatened. In almost all cases, the Wildlife Commission advises that the best approach is a hands-off approach, allowing the bear to leave on its own.

The agency rarely traps and relocates bears. Relocation can be dangerous to the bear, and relocated bears often return to where they were originally captured.

Attorney General Josh Stein Congratulates Winston-Salem Police Department on its Progress Testing Sexual Assault Kits

RALEIGH, NC (April 24, 2019) -- Attorney General Josh Stein today congratulated Winston-Salem Police Department and Chief of Police Catrina Thompson for its progress in submitting sexual assault kits to the State Crime Lab for testing. Winston-Salem Police Department has submitted 346 older sexual assault kits for review and testing.

"Testing these kits sends a clear message to rapists: no matter how long ago you committed your crime, we will not stop tracking you down and convicting you," said Attorney General Josh Stein. "To survivors, understand that we take this crime seriously and we will never stop working to achieve justice. I commend Winston-Salem Police Department on its progress in testing these kits. We typically see more than 10 percent of kits tested result in a DNA match, and I look forward to hearing about the cold cases Winston-Salem Police Department is able to reopen and solve as a result of this evidence."

In 2017, Winston-Salem Police Department reported to the State Crime Lab that the department had 1,339 untested kits. According to that statewide inventory, there were approximately 15,000 untested sexual assault kits in law enforcement custody across the state that have not been submitted to the State Crime Lab.

Since the inventory was conducted, the Attorney General's Office and the State Crime Lab have worked with local law enforcement, including the Winston-Salem Police Department, to submit kits so they can be reviewed, outsourced, tested, and uploaded into the federal database for sexual assault DNA. In February of this year, Winston-Salem Police Department announced that it had made an arrest in a 29-year-old rape case, underscoring the importance of testing these older kits.

Attorney General Stein is working to pass the Survivor Act, legislation that will provide funding to test old kits and put in place requirements that will prevent such a backlog from occurring again. That legislation is currently before the North Carolina House and Senate.
