N.C. pecan growers prevail, good crop for Thanksgiving

RALEIGH, NC (November 18, 2019) -- Pecan pie lovers can celebrate. The North Carolina pecan growers have a good crop ahead of the holidays despite a relatively dry summer and damages sustained during last year's hurricane season.

That is good news for consumers wanting to incorporate local ingredients into their Thanksgiving meals.

"Reports from growers are showing a good quantity and quality of pecans this year, with pecan season running into December," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler.

The department encourages consumers to look for the Got To Be NC logo on packaged pecans, visit local farmers markets or take a trip to more than two dozen pecan orchards across the state. Dec. 13 will be Pecan Day at the State Farmers Market, where visitors can get free samples of a pecan dessert, plus mouth-watering pecan recipes to try at home.

The N.C. Pecan Growers Association offers an online directory to help consumers find local pecan orchards at www.buyncpecans.com. The website also includes pecan recipes and downloadable activities for children.

North Carolina is one of the Top 10 pecan-producing states in the nation. While pecans are grown across the state, the majority of commercial orchards are located in Eastern and Southeastern North Carolina.

99-year-old Granite Falls WWII Veteran Jessie Bowman receives early birthday present

LENOIR, NC (November 19, 2019) -- Jessie Bowman of Granite Falls, a WWII Veteran, received an early birthday present from Wesley Parlier on Tuesday, November 19, 2019. Jessie will turn 100 next month on December 28th.

Jessie's present was a plane ride in a beautifully restored 1941 Boeing PT-17 Stearman biplane - planes like this were used as trainers during WWII. The plane is owned by Granite Falls/Hickory native and South Caldwell High School graduate Wesley Parlier. Wesley has been flying for over 35 years. He took his first flying lesson at age 18 in a Cessna 152 and currently flies Boeing 757's and 767's for United Airlines. So needless to say, Jessie Bowman was in very good hands.

Wesley said it was a great honor to take Jessie for a plane ride.



Jessie said that he was a little apprehensive yet excited about a ride in the plane. After the flight, he said he enjoyed it very much and was glad to be back on the ground. He certainly has a new story to share.

Jessie was drafted into the army in 1944 and fought the Germans throughout the European campaign. He was a gunner operator of an 80mm mortar with company D, 345th infantry of the 87th division. He fought in the battle of Morcy and then went on to the Ardennes Forest and the Black Forest. He also fought in the Battle of the Bulge, St. Vith and then crossed the Moselle River into Koblentz on the Rhine River and finished up fighting to help liberate Plauen in Northern Germany.



Three arrests made in Lenoir after shooting

LENOIR, NC (November 19, 2019) -- On November 18, 2019 at around 2:35 PM the Lenoir Police Department received a report of a possible shooting in the 500 block of Arlington circle in Lenoir. Upon arriving in the area officers located one victim, Kashton Javon Harshaw – 26 years of age – of Lenoir, suffering from apparent gunshots to his lower extremities. Harshaw was transported to Caldwell UNC Healthcare, then later transported by ambulance to Carolina's Medical Center with serious injuries.

Based on witness statements gathered at the scene multiple suspects were involved in an altercation at 520-A Arlington Circle that resulted in the shooting. As a result of the investigation three subjects were arrested. Derek Dusean Davis Jr. – 21 years of age – of Frontier Way in Lenoir was charged with Felony Assault with a Deadly Weapon Inflicting Serious injury for shooting Harshaw. Davis was placed in the Caldwell County Jail under a \$50,000.00 secured bond. Davis' first appearance is scheduled for 11/20/2019 in District Court. Daniel Jeremiah Minton – 22 years of age – of Blowing Rock Boulevard in Lenoir was charged with (4) counts of Felony Discharging a Firearm or Barreled Weapon into an Occupied Dwelling for shooting into the residence of 520-A Arlington Circle. D. Minton was placed in the Caldwell County Jail under a \$100,000.00 secured bond. D. Mintons's first appearance is scheduled for 11/20/2019 in District Court. Jonathan David Minton – 24 years of age – of Blowing Rock Boulevard in Lenoir was charged with Misdemeanor Carrying a Concealed Firearm. J. Minton was placed in the Caldwell County Jail under a \$3000.00 secured bond and he has a court date scheduled for 01/06/2020.

During the initial moments following the call Horizons Elementary School, 332 Greenhaven Drive was placed on lock down only due to the proximity of the shooting and the time of the call. The investigation is ongoing and no other information is available for release at this time.

Two arrested in Lenoir for Drug/Weapons Violations

LENOIR, NC (November 19, 2019) -- On November 18th, 2019 at 9:23 am officers with the Lenoir Police Traffic unit along with officers from the Narcotics Unit stopped a white 2009 Cadillac passenger car near 1346 Norwood St. Lenoir, NC. The driver of the vehicle was identified as Elijah Rashard Gibbs. The passenger in the vehicle was Madison Lily Ruggles.

Gibbs had several outstanding warrants which included 2 counts of Misd. Assault by Pointing a Gun, 1 count of Misd. Breaking & Entering, and 1 count of Communicating Threats. Gibbs was arrested and the vehicle was searched. During the search officers found 154.30 grams of cocaine and \$791.00 in US currency within the center console. According to North Carolina State guidelines, the seized cocaine was valued at \$15,430.00. The officers also found a stolen Smith and Wesson .40 caliber pistol in the glove compartment. The pistol had been reported stolen from Catawba County. As a result, Gibbs was also charged with 1 count of Felony Possession of a Stolen Firearm, 1 count of Felony Possession of a Firearm by a Felon, 1 count of Misd. Carrying a Concealed Weapon, 1 count of Felony Trafficking in Cocaine, 1 count of Felony Maintaining a Vehicle for the Purpose of Controlled Substance, 1 count of Possession of Controlled Substance within 1,000 ft. of a School, 1 count of Misd. Driving While License Revoked, 1 count of Misd. Open Container of Liquor, and 1 count of Left of Center.

Ruggles was also arrested. She was charged with 1 count of Possession of a Stolen Firearm, 1 count of Trafficking in Cocaine, and 1 count of Possession of Controlled Substance within 1,000 feet from a school. When Ruggles was searched officers located 3.2 grams of Marijuana in her clothing. According to North Carolina State guidelines, the seized Marijuana was valued at \$25.00. Subsequently she was charged with 1 count of Simple Possession of Schedule VI controlled Substance.

Gibbs received a combined bond of \$206,500.00 and an initial court date of 11/20/2019 while Ruggles received a bond of \$76,000.00 an initial court date is also scheduled for 11/20/2019.


